November is recognized as Native American Heritage Month. These recognitions celebrate the 3.5 million people in the United States who identify as solely American Indian and Alaska Native, and the additional 6 million who identify as American Indian or Alaska Native and another group.

The first recorded "Thanksgiving" celebration occurred in the Massachusetts Bay Colony to give thanks for "subduing the Pequots" after Dutch and English mercenaries massacred over 700 Indigenous people during their Green Corn Dance in 1637. European people coming to this land joined (willingly or not) in the genocide of Indigenous peoples.

In Santa Clara County, land historically belonged to the Muwekma Ohlone, Amah Mutsun, Esselen, and Taymen tribes. Out of the county's 2 million residents, about 1.2% of residents self-identify as American Indian/Alaskan Natives. Let us remember our local tribes this Thanksgiving.





The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks by Rebecca Skloot (Crown, 2011)

Her name was Henrietta Lacks, but scientists know her as HeLa. She was a poor Southern tobacco farmer who worked the same land as her slave ancestors, yet her cells—taken without her knowledge—became one of the most important tools in medicine: The first "immortal" human cells grown in culture, which are still alive today, though she has been dead for more than sixty years. Henrietta's family did not learn of her "immortality" until more than twenty years after her death when scientists investigating HeLa began using her husband and children in research without informed consent. **TO**
