Dear Members and Friends of the Presbytery of San José,

Grace and peace in the name of Jesus Christ in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.

Next Monday is the birthday of the late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. I am not one who just pulls out a quote from Dr. King once a year around this time. I believe that we are called to be about God's justice every day of the year, to care for the vulnerable and marginalized, to stand with those who are pressed by the weight of systems, actors and policies that are death-dealing and which stifle the flourishing of our common humanity.

Several years ago, there was a good effort by the 223rd General Assembly (2018) to make Dr. King's "Letter from a Birmingham Jail" as part of our PC(USA) *Book of Confessions*. Although Dr. King's Letter didn't pass the voting by presbyteries, it was commended for study, conversation, and reflection. The Assembly noted how important his pastoral and prophetic word was more than ever. As I said, the work, word, and witness for God's transformative justice is a daily call whether in 2018 or in 2026.

When we consider just this week: hearing and receiving testimonies from faith leaders, community members, and residents in Minneapolis and the Twin Cities, these are troubling and perilous times, where posting a once-a-year quote from a revered civil rights leader just doesn't cut it. We need a daily commitment to struggle together. Why? Because it's what Jesus did, it's what Jesus does, it's what Jesus would do.

The living God in Christ is alive and actively at work. Through the voice, hands, heart, feet, mind, and life of you and me - how do we embody the life-giving, love-extending, arms-embracing, be-with-everyone kind of life that our Lord Christ lived? When He says, "I am the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6) he is making a declaration of freedom: in His life there is truth and the way, His way is true life, His truth is the way to life. As followers of Jesus, we have been set free to follow His way, to see the truth, to follow His life so that all may have life.

When we hear our leaders' hopes and dreams of greed for power, privilege, oil money, grabbing Venezuela and Greenland. . .that's not way, truth, and life. When documented immigrants and American citizens on the streets live in fear, fearing if they will return home, that's not way, truth, and life.

Let's use the freedom we have in Christ for the work and witness of justice everywhere, everyday, in every way that the Spirit enables you to do so. While we have breath, says the Psalmist, let us praise God. We praise God with our voices, with our hearts, and yes, with our daily living that extends and embodies God's love and compassion and care to all people. Yes, let us remember and celebrate the late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on Monday. But don't stop there. After all, Dr. King strived to follow the call of Christ everyday. It was that daily call that prompted him to devote his life for the work of justice for all, even to the point of death to himself.

Here's a little bit about them in their own words:



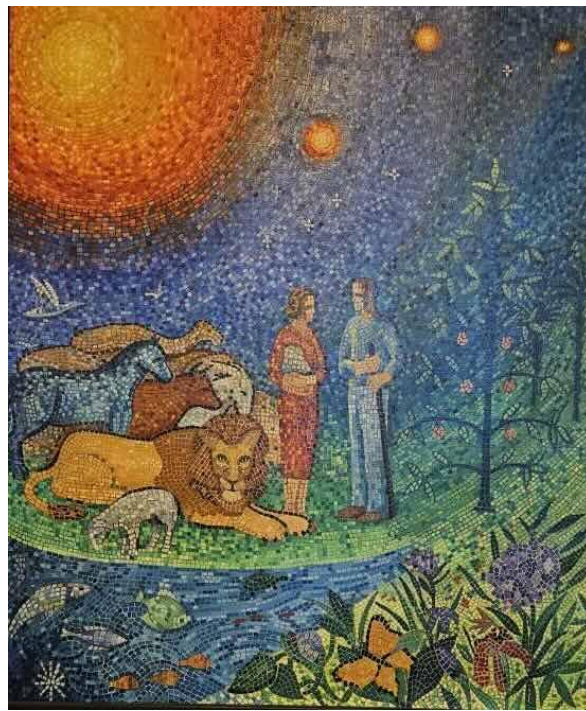

A report issued November 20, 2025 by the American Immigration Council indicated that without the benefit of an attorney at immigration court proceedings, people in our Presbytery have a 70% chance of being deported, often erroneously.

In response to this, the Presbytery's Peace and Justice Working Group has worked with EP Neal Presa to establish a free will offering initiative to support crucial legal counsel for people facing the threat of deportation. The Working Group and Presbytery staff have identified Peacemaking Offering and other related special funds that can provide up to \$15,000 in matching funds. This initiative will run through Pentecost Sunday, May 24, 2026.

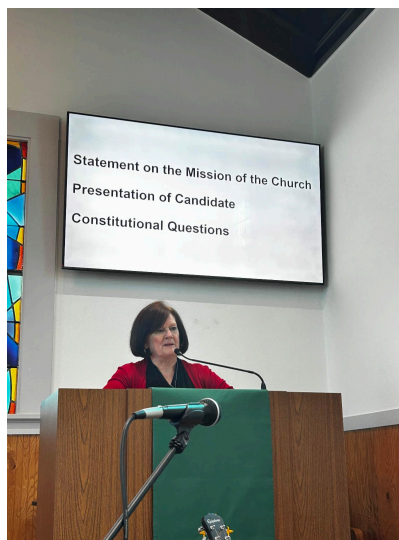
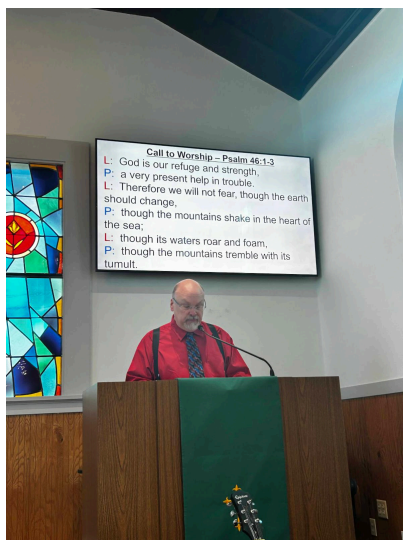

ICYMI: The Rev. Jason Barraca installed at Lincoln Avenue-Salinas

Last Saturday, January 10th, The Rev. Jason Barraca was installed as the Designated Pastor of the Lincoln Avenue Presbyterian Church in Salinas, and becoming the 11th installed pastor in that congregation's history, having been founded in 1898.

Jason served there for 10 years as their Temporary Stated Supply, providing steady pastoral leadership. Jason grew up in that church as a teen, and after college and service in the military, he returned and sensed God's call to ministry. He enrolled at Fuller Theological Seminary, and then helped lead youth ministry, and after several other ministry roles in the congregation, he was called to serve there in pastoral ministry.

Lincoln Avenue Presbyterian Church is a historic Japanese American congregation. During the mid-20th century, many members were interned at one of several U.S. concentration camps. Those members stored their belongings in the church's fellowship hall in hopes they would return. One of their current members, 92 yr old Loren Kitamura, was interned at one of those camps as a school-aged kid.

Installing Jason at a worship service with the ancient gesture of "laying upon hands by the elders" (signifying the invocation of the Holy Spirit, the blessing of God through the Church's witness, and connecting with the great cloud of witness) were representatives of the Presbytery acting as an administrative commission: Moderator Tim Parmentier (CRE, Trinity-San Jose), Stated Clerk Erica Rader, EP Neal Presa, Libby Boatwright (Past Moderator, member at large), Bill Lane (Gonzales), Andy Rausch (Northminster-Salinas, Past Moderator), and Lynn Viale (Past Moderator).

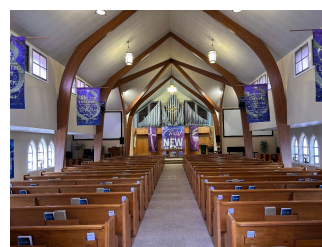
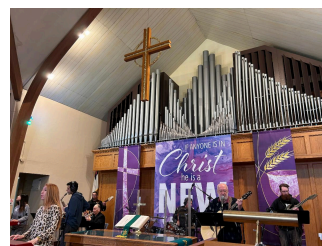

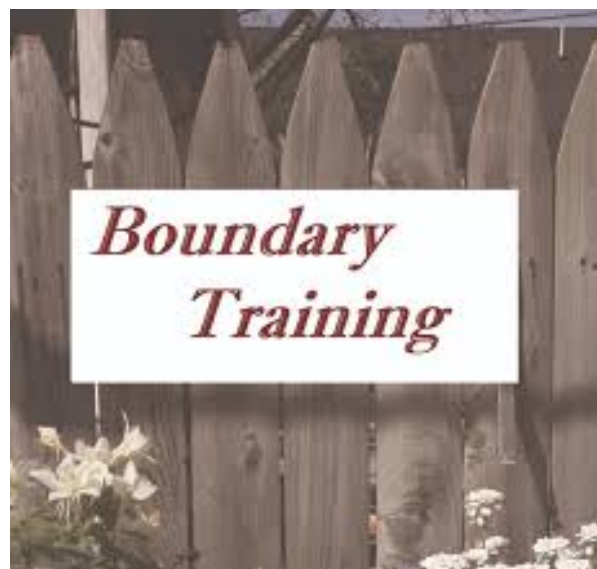
First Presbyterian Church of Santa Clara was formed in 1958, breaking ground in 1959. The church has seen many changes in the world, in the local community, and

Announcing Dates for Required Boundary Trainings

The Rev. Bruce Reyes-Chow (member at-large) will again facilitate required Boundary Training for ruling elders and teaching elders on Saturday, April 18 and Saturday, November 7.

The pattern for both days are:

9:00am-10:00 | Online for ruling elders

10:00-11:00 | Break

11:00-1:00pm | In-Person for teaching elders (with lunch included)

Registration information is forthcoming.

Boundary training is mandatory, required by the Book of Order (G-3.0106), focusing on sexual misconduct, harassment, and child abuse prevention for clergy, session members, and church leaders to maintain safe, healthy ministry relationships. This training, usually every three years, covers professional conduct, technology use, and clear roles
